### LIFE PROFILE



Mary Lucille Simmons Scott, age 95, of 313 Allen St, Woodruff, SC, peacefully graduated this life, Wednesday, September 20, 2023. She was born May 21, 1928 to the late John Simmons and Ella Brown Simmons in Woodruff, SC and the wife of the late Dewitt Scott. She was the seventh of ten children.

Mary loved the Lord. She read her Bible every day and studied to "show herself approved unto God". She not only knew the word; she lived a life pleasing to God. She was a virtuous woman. She attended Trinity AME Zion Church with her mother, Ella Simmons and siblings until she relocated to North Carolina.

She purchased a piano which she learned to play. That was on her "bucket list". A lover of animals, you could always find dogs and birds in her home. Everything had a place in her home. She cleaned from sun up to sun down. The home was spotless. Mary was friendly and outgoing but she had no problem speaking her mind and standing up for herself. A perfect lady when she "stepped out" with the finest of clothes, hats, pocketbooks and shoes, etc. Mary lived alone and took care of herself until she was 92 years old.
